Message From the Mayor



ooking back to March, when the world as we knew it suddenly stopped, our partners, essential workers and residents all stepped up to keep things moving. None of us could have imagined that we would experience a world-wide pandemic in our lifetime.

On behalf of the Village Board, we cannot express the gratitude we have in our community where everyone helps one another when the call for a need arises. From providing food and monetary donations to the food pantries, to ordering carryout from our businesses, to patronizing all our businesses when they were able to finally open. We want to thank everyone for their continued support in our local business community and we will need to continue to rally together for our merchants as we enter a challenging winter season.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

As a Village, we began 2020 in full swing with dedicated resources in economic development for both businesses and residential growth. Our goal is to provide an environment to properly assist, encourage, and recruit new businesses and investments that our residents want, need, and will financially support. Doing so will create value in our Lemont community as a whole and individually to each of our residents.

Our business community adjusted to dealing with the pandemic, and the Village was able to add resources by holding weekly CARES Zoom meetings for our businesses, expanding outdoor seating, and providing resources for both financial grants and loans. We are not out of the woods yet with winter weather upon us, so please remember to patronize our local businesses and do your holiday shopping in Lemont.

Staying home motivated many residents to complete jobs around the house and start new projects. Our Building Department had record permitting months in March, April and May. Development continues in 2020 and beyond with new proposed subdivisions, construction, and commercial renovations. I personally want to thank our Village Board, staff and various committees for their involvement and approval in the following exciting developments that will add significant value in our town:

DOWNTOWN DEVELOPMENT

As one of the Chicago area's most historic downtowns, Lemont's downtown district is unique and reflects the Village's story. It is full of family owned shops and restaurants and is the cornerstone of our community's historic charm, and improvements to make it a thriving mixed-use district are vital to our success. It is important to understand a thriving downtown and added density will support all of our businesses and in turn increase value to all of our Lemont residents.



Marbella of Lemont – Canal Street and Lemont Street

The former Peterson's Hardware site was purchased by Lotus Design and Development in 2019, and the plans for the development were presented and approved by the Historic Preservation Commission on October 8, 2020. The next step will be plan submission to our Planning and Zoning Commission (PZC) who will submit their recommendations to the Village Board. This is a significant development that will bring more foot traffic to our businesses and will attract residents and families of all ages to our downtown area. Once Marbella submits their plans to the PZC, information on this project can be found on our website at www.lemont.il.us/Development-Projects. Lotus Design and Development is the same firm that saved the old St. Patrick's School from demolition through adaptive reuse and reconstructed it into nine luxury apartment units under its original St. James Academy school name.

I & M TIF DISTRICT

As the interest in growth in the downtown continued even in a pandemic, the Village Board approved the Illinois & Michigan (I&M) Redevelopment Plan and Project Tax Increment Finance (TIF) District at the May 11, 2020 Village Board Meeting. The I&M TIF District encompasses property west of the Metra Station to Stephen and Talcott streets. The purpose is to bring needed infrastructure to the historic downtown and amenities that make downtown Lemont a special place. Parcels of the Canal TIF and the Transit Oriented District (TOD) TIF were included in the new I&M Canal TIF for redevelopment potential. The benefit of having TIF Districts is for properties that have sat vacant for a long period of time that generate no tax dollars, to be developed with a tax incentive that will generate tax dollars. The creation of this TIF District follows the recommendations of the Lemont 2030 Comprehensive Plan to develop downtown as a destination for residents and visitors.

BUSINESS GRANTS

The Village used a portion of the CARES Act revenue we received from Cook County to assist with a grant program for businesses. Cook County allocated \$183,000 to the Village to assist with COVID-19 related expenditures. The Lemont CARES grant provided reimbursement for PPE and interior changes, such as new protective barriers and winterization projects for outdoor restaurant and retail operations. There was no required match, but a minimum \$1,000 investment with a maximum award of \$5,000.

In addition, the Village Board approved the Business District Improvement Grant which was reestablished with \$30,000. These 50% matching grants, first offered in 2019, were open to any commercial business in Lemont's "B" or "DD" zoning districts. Following last year's awards, the grant was capped at \$5,000. For commercial businesses located in one of Lemont downtown's three TIF districts, the matching grants were proposed with a \$25,000 cap, reflecting the greater expense of restoring historic, existing buildings, plus the additional financial support the TIF districts provide.


Message from the Mayor – Cont'd

RECREATIONAL DESTINATION

Lemont has what people are looking for; proximity to transit, great schools, safe community, a historic downtown, and lots of charm. Our unique assets are what sets us apart from other communities and we are becoming a desired recreation destination.

The Forge: Lemont Quarries

Did someone say *ICE-SKATING* in Lemont? YES! The Forge will debut a 3,600 square-foot ice skating rink with available skate rental in early December! July finally brought the long-awaited opening of this adventure park that brings a recreation aspect to Lemont like nothing around. Nestled within nature, activities at The Forge include aerial challenge courses, 1,000-foot zip lines measuring the longest in the region, the skyscraper climbing tower – named so because you can view the Chicago skyline from it – mountain biking, rappelling, kids courses, outdoor adventure dining and so much more. If you have not yet been there, be sure to take a walk around the area to see all the adrenaline taking place throughout the park. The Forge will offer a variety of family-friendly winter activities, so be sure to visit their Facebook page or website to check it all out – @theforgelemont or at www.forgeparks.com.



We are excited to announce a new intergovernmental agreement with Lemont Park District for 27 acres of MWRD land at the foot of Stephen Street along the Chicago Sanitary and Ship Canal that was approved by the Village Board in October. This former industrial site will be reborn for community recreation and events over several phases. The design features over 22 acres of open space and 1.5 acres of future native areas along the canal with other stormwater BMPs including rain gardens, permeable pavers, and bioswales.





The future park will bring more visitors to enjoy downtown's many boutiques, restaurants, and brewery and is near the I&M Canal and Trail, which takes visitors to the Heritage Quarries Recreation Area and The Forge: Lemont Quarries. It will be a welcoming area for residents and visitors alike.

STEPHEN STREET TRAIL BRIDGE AND TRAILHEAD

For several years, the Village and committees have been researching ways to connect the regional bike paths in the area. There are thousands of miles of trails that converge into Lemont, but do not necessarily connect to the trails within Lemont. If grants and funding are obtained, and the requirements from the Coast Guard are able to be met, we could potentially have a bridge over the Chicago Sanitary and Ship Canal at the north end of Stephen Street that would connect the existing trail system to the I&M Canal Trail, our quarries, and into the downtown.



FINANCE DEPARTMENT NEWS

The Village of Lemont has successfully refunded its 2012A bonds, saving approximately \$364,000 with a rate of 1.38%. Robert Vail of Bernardi Securities writes, "The Village's bonds had extremely high demand from our municipal bond investor base and our underwriting desk was able to push rates lower than other 'AA' rated bonds that have recently priced. The strong credit metrics of the Village aren't going unnoticed with investors, and while Moody's rates the Village 'Aa2' — as shown in recent pricing comparisons, investors are willing to purchase the Village's bonds and nearly 'Aaa' rates."

On October 1, 2020, Moody's Investor Services reaffirmed the Village's 'Aa2' bond rating, reporting, "The credit profile of Lemont (Aa2) benefits from strong tax base in the Chicago (Ba1 stable) metropolitan area and favorable resident income levels. . . . The Village's financial position is healthy" (Moody's Credit Opinion 1 October 2020).

LEMONT AREA HISTORICAL SOCIETY CELEBRATES 50 YEARS!





The Lemont Area Historical Society (LAHS) is celebrating its "50th Golden Year Anniversary" in 2020! The Lemont Historical Society is located in historic downtown Lemont in what is now known as "The Old Stone Church." Built in 1861, this church was formerly known as the Lemont United Methodist Church, which was used as a recruiting station for the Union Army during the Civil War.

The Lemont Area Historical Society has been hard at work preserving Lemont's rich history since 1970! The organization was originally formed by citizens of our community who did not want us to forget the sacrifices made by past generations to bring us into the future. Since that point in time, the LAHS has been involved in so many projects relating to the different aspects of our town. The organization hosts group tours of the museum, downtown, and quarries and rents the chapel for weddings. The LAHS is the depository of Lemont's records involving genealogy, etc., and reached out to the school system to discover new ways to help our young people appreciate what has come before.

LAHS Membership consists of willing volunteers who have helped the Historical Society throughout the years to stay afloat as they are completely independent and rely on tours, fundraisers and donations for funding. Other groups like the Lemont Garden Club help them with the museum garden and do such a fabulous job. *50 Years* is a long time, but they are only getting started — and will survive because of those who care and offer their time and talents to help them in good times and bad. SEASONAL REMINDERS

LANDSCAPE WASTE COLLECTION ENDS THE FIRST FULL WEEK IN DECEMBER

All landscape waste, including brush and other branches is collected once per week on the same day as the regular refuse and recycling collection from April 1 through the first full week of December each year.

Residents with yard waste materials may simply place the materials in a kraft-type paper bag, up to 33 gallons capacity. Shrubbery cuttings, tree branches and twigs must be placed either in a Kraft paper bag or in a securely tied bundle. Ties must be made of string or twine. Branch bundles must not exceed 4 feet in length. Bags containing landscape waste and/or branch bundles cannot exceed 50 pounds in weight.

SALTING AND SNOW REMOVAL

The Public Works Department begins ice and snow control measures even before hazardous road conditions are expected. As soon as conditions warrant it, the salting process begins on major streets designated as primary routes, hills, curves, and all intersections. Residential streets that are relatively flat will be salted only at intersections. Salt remains the most cost effective means of breaking the bond between ice and street, especially with Lemont's unique topography.

Plowing commences after snow accumulates to an inch or more. Village roadways are divided into 9 zones for the plowing process with primary routes, including hills and school bus routes, being plowed first. As soon as primary routes are cleared, crews will move on to the secondary routes. After all streets are open, trucks will begin the curbing operation.

The goal of the Public Works Department is to remove snow from all streets within six hours after the conclusion of a significant snowfall. Your cooperation in removing vehicles from the street and observing the odd-even parking regulations will make this job easier and more efficient.

WINTER PARKING REMINDER

During and after any snowfall, please try to remove vehicles from Village streets if at all possible to facilitate clearing. If removing vehicles is not possible, AFTER a snowfall of 2 inches or more, please park on the ODD-numbered side of the street on odd calendar days, EVEN-numbered side of the street on even calendar days. The day is considered to begin at 9:00 a.m.

EMERGENCIES DURING A WINTER STORM

If an emergency arises during a winter storm, residents should dial 911. All Public Works plowing vehicles maintain continuous two-way radio communication with the Police Department. Snow removal equipment can provide immediate support to ambulance and fire equipment.

DAMAGED PROPERTY

The Village replaces mailboxes that have been damaged through direct contact with a snow plow, if the original mailbox was installed in compliance with Village regulations. If your mailbox is struck, a temporary repair will be made so that you can continue to receive mail delivery. When winter ends and the ground thaws, final repairs will be made. If replacement of the mailbox or post is required, a standard metal rural size mailbox and 4 x 4 wooded wolmanized post kit will be utilized. All final mailbox repairs are typically completed by early spring.

HOW TO REPORT A STREET LIGHT OUTAGE

To report a street light outage, go to our Village website's front page, and click on, "Report A Concern" which will become "Citizens Support Center" in mid-December. Navigate to Streets & Public Places, Streetlights. Please report the tag number located on the pole. The yellow tag number will start with either a C or V, maintained by ComEd or the Village of Lemont. You may report the ComEd lights to the Village, who will then report the outage to ComEd. Residents can also call Public Works at (630) 257-2532 between 7:30 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.

COVID-19 Contact Tracing Scams

Lemont Police Department wants to educate residents of possible scams that involve people impersonating COVID-19 contact tracers to steal social security numbers and banking information over the phone, via email, and through text messages.

As part of the contact tracing process, health department officials reach out to people who test positive for COVID-19 and those who have been in close contact with a confirmed case. Contract tracers will first try to reach residents over the phone and then via text message. Health departments will only leave messages asking you to call back.

Contact tracers interview people who test positive for COVID-19 over the phone, help them recall where they have been and who they have seen while infectious and give guidance and support so you can take steps to protect others. Health officials say time is crucial in the process since a person could spread COVID-19 to others before they know they are infected.

The interview is voluntary, and you may choose what information you share.

- A contract tracer will **NEVER**: Ask for your Social Security number
 - Ask for money, bank account or credit card numbers, or any other form of payment
 - Ask for your immigration status
 - Threaten consequences of not participating or answering questions

Contact tracers notify the COVID-19 case's close contacts about their possible exposure, but they do not disclose the name or any other personal details of the COVID-19 case to the contacts. After speaking with a contact tracer, people who need to self-quarantine will be asked to log their symptoms each day using new contact tracing software implemented by the State of Illinois. These daily messages will be sent via email or text messages, according to health officials.

If you receive a suspicious call, text message, or email about contact tracing or exposure to COVID-19, call your local health department. Staff can help verify if you have been contacted by them. Visit http://dph.illinois.gov/covid19/contact-tracing-data?DV=1.

No Shave November Extends Through January

Lemont residents may notice some less than clean-shaven police officers over the next few months. Members of the Lemont Police Department are participating in "No Shave November" again this year. "No Shave November" is an annual event involving the growing of beards and mustaches during the month of November to raise awareness of various cancers.

Participating officers must make a donation to be allowed to grow facial hair and be excused from the Department's strict uniform/ appearance guidelines. Female officers and staff can also participate by painting their fingernails, which is also restricted by the guidelines. A portion of all proceeds will be matched by the Lemont Police Benevolent Association. This year, "No Shave November" will be extended through the end of December (donations accepted through January). Proceeds raised through January will benefit two Lemont families that are currently battling cancer.
